The Alzheimer's Society (2013) estimates that 160,000 deaths per year are directly attributable to dementia as a principal or contributory cause.

At any one time up to 50% of patients on wards caring for older people in acute hospitals will have dementia, delirium, or both.

Deaths where dementia is a certified cause indicate that 30% occur in hospital. However, this figure is likely to be an underestimate because of the extensive under diagnosis of dementia.

Hospital admissions are difficult experiences for any patient, but may be particularly stressful for patients affected by dementia and confusion.

Dementia is not always recognised to be a terminal illness, even though cognitive impairment is a 'strong independent predictor of mortality in older people.'
