A MINI Merseyside Viking Navy went to Norway to row the biggest-ever reconstruction of a Viking longship. More than 50 volunteers

More than 50 volunteers visited Karmøy to practise on board the Draken Harald Hafagre – Harald the Fairhair, in English.

The rowers have been trained by Liverpool Victoria Rowing Club in Wallasey and were joined by volunteers from the Midlands.

The group will row the 114ft longship when it arrives in Wirral next year as part of its maiden voyage.

The voyage will follow the path of the Vikings from Scandinavia via the British Isles to Istanbul – with Wirral one of the first stops.

Professor Stephen Harding, of Nottingham University, the north west England represent-

ative for the project, said: "This has been a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity too good to miss. I think it's fair to say that everybody thoroughly enjoyed the trip.

trip.
"It has given the volunteers a taste of what it might have been like in the Viking Age, when young people looked forward to a journey of adventure, an excitement captured in the old Sagas.

"Our Norwegian hosts have been absolutely fantastic and covered most of our expenses while we were over there.

"We look forward now to the prospect of this magnificent vessel coming to us, which if all goes to plan will be next year. "When it does come, the experience our volunteers have picked up here will have been invaluable."

The rowing of the Viking ship was part of the annual Viking Festival at Karmøy on the west coast of Norway – where many of the Norse Vikings, including those who settled in the Wirral, are thought to have originated from.

The trip finished with a traditional reading from the Norse Sagas by Viking

Sagas by Viking novelist Giles Kristian, who presented each volunteer with a copy of one of his latest books.

The ship was due to sail to book.com/th Wirral this year but the voyage was delayed for

more testing.

The project team, based in Haugesund, Norway, decided the Darken should stay within Scandinavian waters during the 2013

sailing season for further testing, before setting sail for the UK next year.

When the boat does arrive in Wirral, the volunteers will row it into the West Float in Wallasey, across the River Mersey to the Albert Dock in Liverpool and out of the estuary again.

Professor Harding said: "It's

Professor Harding said: "It's very different from rowing in a normal rowing boat – which takes a maximum of eight persons, whereas the Draken takes

"Once we got used to its size, the rowing was very smooth and I think we even impressed our hosts!"
