The Spring 2014 closed colloquium of the *International Consortium for the Study of Post-Conflict Reconstruction and Reconciliation* will be hosted at, and with the support of, the University of Nottingham, in partnership and cooperation with the Università di Bologna, the Universidad Autónoma de Madrid, the Universidade do Minho, the Université de Lille, the Instituto Camões Lisbon, the Banco de Santander, and the London Embassy of the Republic of Argentina.
